# Post-Graduation Activities Report

Luther College Class of 2018


### Introduction

"Class of 2018" refers to those students who graduated July 1, 2017 – June 30, 2018, most of whom (78.9%) graduated in May, 2018. The data collection process for this report took place from September 2018 to December 2018. Data were gathered primarily through the Higher Education Data Sharing (HEDS) First Destination Survey, followed by telephone calls to nonrespondents, contacts with academic departments, and surveying social media in December 2018. Through these efforts, Luther College achieved a response rate of **90.7%**, with data on 430 out of 474 graduates. This rate includes all data from reliable and verifiable sources.

### Post-Graduation Activities

Post-college activities of the 2018 graduates were divided into eight categories: employed, which includes full-time and part-time employment (72.1%); accepted/enrolled in graduate school or another program of continuing education (14.9%); participating in a volunteer or service program (7.0%); planning to continue education but not yet enrolled (3.3%); still seeking employment (1.9%); serving in the U.S. military (0%); and participating in none of these activities (0.7%). A few categories deserve further explanation. The "employed" category includes students who were employed either full-time (93%) or part-time (7%), both of which include internships and fellowships. Per the U.S. Department of Labor, full-time employment is defined as working a minimum of 30 hours per week. Students in a "program of continuing education" were enrolled in an undergraduate program to further their education, for example, to obtain a teaching license, or were participating in some other activity to gain the necessary credentials to enter their field of choice.



When asked if their position was related to their career goals, **86.1%** of employed 2018 graduates responded affirmatively.


### Current Position Related to Career Goals



# Graduates Pursuing Further Education

Among the 2018 graduates who elected to attend graduate or professional school, the largest percentage (33%) reported pursuing a master's degree in arts or sciences. Other advanced degrees being sought include medical (21%), other master's degree (e.g., MAT, MFA, MPA, etc.) (18%), PhD (5%), and law (5%). An additional 10% are in certificate programs and 7% are pursuing a second Bachelor's degree. Minnesota, Iowa, and Wisconsin were top destination states for students pursuing studies in graduate or professional school, with 32%, 18%, and 12% respectively. Other states included Illinois and Nebraska, each attracting 5% of our students for graduate study. The remaining 28% of surveyed students are pursuing their graduate studies in one of 14 other states and two countries abroad.

## **Employment Activities**

When asked about the primary status of grads' full-time and part-time employment, the largest employment activity for the class of 2018 was being hired by an employer or organization, describing 86% of respondents. Other full-time and part-time employment statuses fall under the other categories listed on the right. Participating in an internship or fellowship (7%) and temporary/contract work (6%) were the next most common statuses for the 2018 respondents.

# Geographic Location of Employment

For those students who joined the workforce, the location of employment spans the nation. Minnesota was the top destination for 2018 graduates, attracting **45**% of the class. Iowa was next most popular, with **30**%. Wisconsin attracted **7**% of graduates, Illinois **3**%, and Colorado **3**%. The remaining **10**% of employed graduates found employment outside of this five-state region.

## Selected Employers

Graduates pursued employment across a wide variety of regional, national, and international organizations, with 64% working in the private sector and **36%** in the public sector. While most report working in for-profit businesses (58%), 42% are employed at not-forprofit enterprises. The table highlights a few of the employers, followed by the number of Luther graduates hired. The list is not exhaustive, but it does provide a snapshot of where grads are contributing.

### Volunteer Service

**7.0%** of the class of 2018 pursued volunteer service as their initial career path after leaving Luther. **Twelve** Luther graduates chose to volunteer with AmeriCorps programs. **Eight** graduates are serving with the Lutheran Volunteer Corps and **three** with the Peace Corps. Other graduates fill a variety of volunteer positions across the country and around the world.

## Migration of Iowa/Non-Iowa Residents


For several years Iowa legislators have focused on the migration of college-educated individuals. Graduates who pursue employment or graduate school in and out of Iowa are commonly referred to as "brain gain/brain drain." These tables reflect the migration of Luther graduates for employment and graduate school, categorized by their respective home state, or state of residency. For example, of the Iowa residents who are employed, 76% were working in the state of Iowa while 24% accepted employment in another state. Of the Iowa residents enrolled in graduate school, 48% are attending an Iowa institution while 52% enrolled in an institution in another state. The tables also include migration data for Luther graduates from both Minnesota and Wisconsin.

### CONCLUSION

Based on nine years of survey data, Luther graduates have successfully found employment, entered graduate school, and sought volunteer opportunities, regardless of economic conditions. The proportion of those choosing to enter the workforce as a first destination has risen while those entering graduate school immediately has declined (see graph). The percentage of Luther graduates still seeking employment by the end of the 2018 calendar year was very low at 1.9%; the U.S. unemployment rate for 2018 was 4.0%.

The table on the last page summarizes the data that contributed to this report. The table is organized according to majors. Students who majored in more than one area are represented in each of the majors they obtained; therefore, the distribution of majors listed in the table *does not* correspond to the number of 2018 graduates.
